

WORDS FROM THE EXECUTIVE MANAGER OF INFRASTRUCTURE

Project updates from the past few months.

Robinson Road Footpath: The majority of this project was outsourced to Stirling Asphalt. However, our team played a crucial role by clearing the edges as requested by Stirling Asphalt, allowing them to come in and spray the tack coat and lay the asphalt. Following this, our team laid cracker dust on the crossovers to protect the path edges and ensure easy access for property owners.

Orchard Road: This project involved re-sheeting and reforming a 1.2 km section of the road that was severely affected by unstable clay and sand bases, which were prone to erosion. We used a high-quality product sourced from the Stronach Road Pit. The Shire Team's efforts were exceptional, with strong support from Kloppers Construction for cartage, tipping, and pushing up the gravel.

Oxley Road :This road presented a safety issue, particularly in the floodway. We conducted temporary repairs on sections of the road and patched multiple areas to ensure it remains functional until Safe Roads WA began major pavement repairs in July, funded by R2R. The Shire Team completed all this work to a high standard.

Road Sign Replacement: Our team has been diligently replacing old, faded, and damaged road signs with new, highly visible ones. This effort has also involved significant pruning and vegetation clearance to improve visibility for road users. Despite challenging weather conditions, the team continues to push forward with this and many other tasks throughout the community.

Road Clearance - Trees: The recent wind and rain have led to numerous fallen trees across roads, making this a regular task for our team. Their dedication to keeping the roads clear and safe is commendable.

Douglas Road: Douglas Road required a tidy-up and gravel sheeting, which the team has completed in specific sections. The difference between the before and after is clearly visible below.

WORDS FROM THE EXECUTIVE MANAGER OF INFRASTRUCTURE

Robinson Road West: The Shire Team's hard physical work on several sections of Robinson Road West has yielded excellent results. They prepared the shoulders, cleaned up the table drains, and then collaborated with the Seal Team from Boral to reseal approximately 500 metres of Robinson Road West from the Great Southern Highway. This also included a small section of seal on Orchard Road.

Robinson Road East: The Shire Team worked diligently and professionally on approximately the 5-10 SLK of Robinson Road East. Their work involved reforming and resheeting the road, clearing buried culverts, and installing delineators.

Oxley Road: The hard and dedicated work of the Shire Team on Oxley Road has resulted in a fantastic outcome.

Youngs Road: The Shire Team carried out a simple clean-up of the shoulders and verges, allowing the Seal Team from Boral to reseal approximately 250 metres of Youngs Road. The particularly problematic floodway was successfully addressed, ensuring the Shire can withstand the rough weather in anticipation of the pavement repairs commencing on 15 July 2024.

Placement of a Defibrillator: The Team have placed the defibrillator at the entrance to the Shire Office for public use in an emergency, many thanks to the Katanning St Johns Service for the huge part they played in the availability of the defibrillator.

Next month, we will cover the Pavement Repairs and ongoing work that has been taking place from late July through early August.

WORDS FROM THE EXECUTIVE MANAGER OF INFRASTRUCTURE

The Shire's LRCI road program for 2023/24 has been a resounding success, and credit goes to the Shire Team and the contractors mentioned throughout this report. Together, we successfully delivered a 2+ year program in just two and a half weeks.

The Shire's Executive Manager of Infrastructure has completed a review of the LRCI Projects and is very pleased with the results, which are highlighted in the photos throughout this article. However, these images represent only a small snapshot of the extensive work completed across the Shire of Woodanilling and delivered for the community by 30 June 2024.

Since 30 June, the range of jobs, tasks, and projects has been numerous and varied. The team continues to punch above their weight in providing excellent service to the community.

FIREFIGHTERS WILL BE TOO BUSY FIGHTING FIRES ON THE FRONTLINE TO BE ABLE TO DEFEND YOUR HOME AND PROPERTY.

To reduce the spread of fire and provide some shelter,







PROPERTY UPKEEP

Set calendar reminders to complete these preparations monthly during fire season.

- Out the grass around your property to 10cm or less.
- Prune shrubs so they are not dense.
- Ensure gas cylinders are chained/secured upright.
- Check gas release valves face away from property.
- O Clean gutters.

RURAL PROTECTION

Complete these preparations if you own a rural property.

- Make sure fire trucks can access and turn around on your property.
- Check bridge loading and cattle grid loading for fire truck access.
- Create fire breaks along paddock boundaries.
- Store petrol and gas safely.
- Install underground water pumps that lead from dams to the house.
- If a fire threatens, move livestock to a well grazed paddock.
- Check generator and pumps are working.

LASTING PROTECTION

Set calendar reminders to complete these preparations annually.

- Keep gas cylinders away from likely direction of fire (i.e. where bush is) and turn release valves outwards.
- Remove shrubs, wood, mulch or any flammable material, against or near the house.
- Block any gaps under floor, in the roof spaces, under eaves, external vents, skylights, chimneys and wall claddings.
- Install metal fly wire mesh on all windows, vents and install a protective screen on evaporative air conditioner.
- Create a mineral earth firebreak along the boundary of your property.
- Install a fire or heat radiant shield such as a solid fence.

Saving Woody's Salmon Gum

Some residents of Woody may be aware of damage that was being done to the heritage listed tree in the centre of town.

Parrots had been nesting in the tree and ringbarking it (as a defense against predators stealing eggs) however this was severe damage and risked the tree dying, which with its considerable height could result in significant injury from falling limbs or tree collapse.

After a process that took

some time to work out the best plan of action, we managed to seal up the nesting hollow and erect wire mesh around the remaining bark keeping the tree alive to protect from any further stripping.



Sounds simple right? But 20m up a tree not so much. Thankfully Shire of Woody staff member Darren has a




working at heights qualification and could oversee Gen up the tree also! We managed to secure the mesh, block up the hollow and hopefully this will ensure the tree maintains its canopy and prevents any further degratation. There are some dying limbs at height however so please exercise caution when passing underneath, especially after some windy weather!

RECIPES

LEMON GARLIC ROAST LAMB



1.5-1.75kg leg of lamb salt and cracked black pepper olive oil 12 sprigs rosemary 3 lemons, halved 3 garlic heads, halved roasted vegetables, to serve



Step 1

Preheat oven to 200°C. Score the lamb at 2cm intervals and rub with salt, pepper and olive oil.

Step 2

Scatter the rosemary in a pile in the centre of a baking dish, along with lemon and garlic. Top with the lamb. Fill the baking dish with enough water to come 1cm up from the base of the dish.

Step 3

Place the lamb in the oven. For cooking time allow 30 minutes per 500g. Cover the lamb with foil after 20 minutes to avoid it becoming too brown, then uncover for the final 20 minutes of cooking. Top up the water a little as the lamb cooks to avoid the lamb drying out.

Step 4

Once the lamb is cooked through, or to your liking, remove from oven, cover and rest for 15 minutes. Slice and serve with roasted vegetables.

APRICOT CHICKEN

Step 1

Preheat oven to 200C/180C fan-forced. Grease a large baking tray with sides. Line tray with baking paper.

Step 2

Drain apricots, reserving 1/3 cup juice. Remove leaves from 1 rosemary sprig. Finely chop. Place soup mix, chopped rosemary, oil and reserved juice in a jug. Stir until well combined. Arrange chicken, apricots, potato and onion, in a single layer, on prepared tray. Drizzle over soup mixture. Season with salt and pepper.

Step 3

Bake, turning chicken and adding remaining rosemary sprigs halfway, for 45 minutes or until chicken is cooked through and potato is tender. Serve.






