Woodanilling Town Team News - For those who have not yet heard, the Woodanilling Town Team is becoming active in the community. The Town Team has now officially been sponsored by the Woodanilling CWA, who will provide the administrative and organisational support to this community-driven team of town builders! The Woodanilling Town Team has already hosted two markets in town and is planning to undertake community projects, such as the revitalisation of our main street planter boxes. ## PROPERTY **UPKEEP**

Set calendar reminders to complete these preparations monthly during fire season.

- Cut the grass around your property to 10cm or less.
- Prune shrubs so they are not dense.
- Ensure gas cylinders are chained/secured upright.
- Check gas release valves face away from property.
- Clean gutters.

#### RURAL **PROTECTION**

Complete these preparations if you own a rural property.

- Make sure fire trucks can access and turn around on your property.
- Check bridge loading and cattle grid loading for fire truck access.
- Create fire breaks along paddock boundaries.
- Store petrol and gas safely.
- Install underground water pumps that lead from dams to the house.
- If a fire threatens, move livestock to a well grazed paddock.
- Check generator and pumps are working.

## LASTING **PROTECTION**

Set calendar reminders to complete these preparations annually.


- Keep gas cylinders away from likely direction of fire (i.e. where bush is) and turn release valves outwards.
- Remove shrubs, wood, mulch or any flammable material, against or near the house.
- Block any gaps under floor, in the roof spaces, under eaves, external vents, skylights, chimneys and wall claddings.
- Install metal fly wire mesh on all windows, vents and install a protective screen on evaporative air conditioner.
- Create a mineral earth firebreak along the boundary of your property.
- Install a fire or heat radiant shield such as a solid fence.



Please be aware that magpie swooping season is in full swing, so it's important to protect yourself and your children. To stay safe, wear a hat, put on sunglasses, and consider carrying an umbrella for extra protection. Remember, never provoke or harass magpies, as this can make them more aggressive. Swooping season typically lasts for about 6 to 8 weeks, so stay vigilant during this time.

# Saving Woody's Salmon Gum

Some residents of Woody may be aware of damage that was being done to the heritage listed tree in the centre of town.

Parrots had been nesting in the tree and ringbarking it (as a defense against predators stealing eggs) however this was severe damage and risked the tree dying, which with its considerable height could result in significant injury from falling limbs or tree collapse.

After a process that took

some time to work out the best plan of action, we managed to seal up the nesting hollow and erect wire mesh around the remaining bark keeping the tree alive to protect from any further stripping.



Sounds simple right? But 20m up a tree not so much. Thankfully Shire of Woody staff member Darren has a



working at heights qualification and could oversee Gen up the tree also! We managed to secure the mesh, block up the hollow and hopefully this will ensure the tree maintains its canopy and prevents any further degratation. There are some dying limbs at height however so please exercise caution when passing underneath, especially after some windy weather!



## **RECIPES**

## **CLASSIC SHEPARDS PIE**

#### **INGREDIENTS**

1 tbsp olive oil 1 brown onion, halved, finely chopped 1 carrot, peeled, finely chopped 2 celery sticks, trimmed, finely chopped 500g lamb mince 2 tbsp plain flour 1 tbsp Tomato Paste 1 tbsp Worcestershire sauce 1 bay leaf 500ml (2 cups) Massel beef style stock 4 (about 200g each) desiree potatoes, peeled, chopped 40g butter 125ml (1/2 cup) milk

Melted butter, to brush

#### Step 1

Heat oil in a large saucepan over medium-high heat. Add onion, carrot, and celery, and cook, stirring, for 5 minutes or until soft. Add lamb mince and cook, stirring to break up any lumps, for 5 minutes or until the lamb changes colour.

#### Step 2

Add the flour and cook, stirring, for 2 minutes or until combined. Add tomato paste, Worcestershire sauce, bay leaf, and stock. Bring to the boil. Reduce heat to low and cook, stirring occasionally, for 30 minutes or until sauce thickens. Taste and season.

#### Step 3

Meanwhile, cook potatoes in a saucepan of salted boiling water for 15 minutes or until tender. Drain well. Return to the pan with the butter. Use a potato masher or fork to mash until smooth. Add milk and use a wooden spoon to stir until combined. Taste and season with salt and pepper.

#### Step 4


Preheat oven to 200°C. Spoon the lamb mixture into a 2L (8-cup) capacity ovenproof baking dish, or use four individual ovenproof serving dishes. Top with mashed potato and use a fork to spread it over the lamb mixture. Brush with butter. Bake in the preheated oven for 20 minutes or until the mashed potato is golden brown. Serve immediately.





## **KOJONUP LANDCARE**

#### Landcare in Action – Blackwood catchment habitat and water quality improvements through fencing revegetation

In 2021 the Shire of Kojonup was successful in obtaining funding from the State Natural resource management office to complete a three-year project across properties within the Blackwood catchment.



The Blackwood Catchment is one of the largest in the South West Region spanning over 300km from Dumbleyung in the upper reaches, Kojonup in the central region and Augusta in the lower reaches with intensive land use through cropping, grazing, horticulture and viticulture

Much of the land has been cleared with scattered remnant vegetation through the catchment with much of it disconnected. With only 15.5% of land within the Shire of Kojonup covered by native vegetation and of that 13.5% of that being on privately held land improvements and protection of remnant vegetation is of great importance. Salinity continues to be an issue in the catchment not just in low lying areas impacting on productive agricultural land.





This project aimed to engage farmers or landholders within the Shire of Kojonup to undertake revegetation of creeklines and remnant bushland to improve the connectivity of vegetation, reduce salinity and nutrient loading.

Funding enabled the participants to install 24km of fencing, and plant 68,000 trees over three years protecting and enhancing 90 hectares of remnant bushland and creeklines, Landholders in kind contributions were made in the way of site preparation, weed and pest control, fence installation and planting.

Farmers organised their own planting teams with family and friends workers completing the planting across all years.

## How it Came together

Seedlings were sourced from a number of nurseries locally and from Perth and delivered to individual with 50 different varieties been planted. The landholders were responsible for sourcing fencing materials and were able to either engage a contractor or install the fencing themselves with materials covered by the funding.

2022 was a wet winter and with spring rains that provided a great start for seedlings to establish. Summer monitoring showed high survival rates across the sites. With the exception of one site where kangaroos caused a 40% loss. 2023 was much drier in comparison however seedling survival was quite high and the establishment of those planted in 2022 continued.

A 10 percent infill was allowed for as part of the project with these been planted in 2023 and 2024.

The average cost of the project per hectare was \$4500 which included funding and landholder contributions.

This project shows great Environmental Stewardship and we thank those who participated.





natural resource management program





This was our first time participating with Landcare. The farm land had been in blue gums for 30 +yrs before we turned the land back to farm land, we could see the benefits of what the plantations had done to the creek lines reducing the salinity impact and the self-sown trees that had again started to occupy the creek lines. We where under no imagination that planting the creek lines would stop the salinity from returning, for us is was more a visual pleasing aspect to be able to return the creek line to a more healthy state.

The grant helped us to achieve this in a viable way. We planted 25000 in 5 days using a chatfield Ezy tree planter from Cranbook Gillamii Centre to help us achieve the time frame. We utilised a niece and nephew during the school holidays to fill in some areas the planter wasn't viable to use.

Unfortunately we have had our fair battle with Kangaroos and realistically lost 60% natives in 6 months of planting, which was disappointing. So on our own accord we invested in tree guards that have made the survival rate more in the 90% success rate. We now choose to plant 1000 trees a year in the areas that the kangaroos controlled and have great results. Tree Guards certainly are an expensive upfront cost but with labour /machinery running costs to achieve a good survival rate I see them as money well spent. (No one likes to do things twice).

I would recommend others to participate in these projects




The main reasons for my interest in the project were firstly to try to improve the growth around some salt affected areas and hopefully stop the spread of these areas, and at the same time improve the appearance of these areas.

Then secondly there's the areas that are not salt affected that we have fenced off and planted several hundred trees in; while there is no specific potential benefit to our farming practice like with the salt affected areas, the idea of returning some of our less productive areas to native vegetation and in doing so adding to the total tree population over our farm, while at the same time reducing our environmental footprint does appeal a lot to me.

While it has only been two years since planting began, I have been really surprised to see how so many of the plants are already thriving (despite seven months without rain earlier this year!), and an improvement in some salt scalds can already be seen.

The only slight issue that we have is areas that were hand planted (in places that are inaccessible to the tractor and tree planter) are clearly at a disadvantage to the areas that were cultivated with the tree planter.





Changerup - Farmer



I farm with my wife Diana and our children Amy and George at Tarup Creek in the Shire of Kojonup.

We had started planting trees in our creek lines on our own accord when we first moved here. We found by partnering with landcare it was a way to help fast track what we wanted to achieve for our

farm and have found it to be a great experience.

We first started the process with Jane Kowald who was the landcare officer in town and she helped us to make a long term plan and finished with Adele Scarfone. We have been fortunate enough to

receive five landcare grants over the years and are very grateful to all the work that these two people have put into it all.

My uncle Owen once said to me it is important to leave your place better for the next generation than you inherited it.

I would strongly recommend anyone to get involved with landcare on your property I have really enjoyed it and seeing the difference it has made to our farm.
